#### **November General Meeting Program:**


Kathleen Duncan is a Vancouver Washington woodturner, who also serves as the AAW Secretary.

# The Pacific Northwest: A Woodturning Mecca.

ERHAPS it is due to the abundance of forests, or the cold winters that drive us indoors, or it might just be the expressive, hands-on culture found in the Upper Left-hand Corner of the United States, but I'm convinced there are about 5000 serious

woodtumers within 250 miles of this venue. That's a whole lot of wood chips!

Woodtumers are a remarkably clever, resourceful bunch. They come form all walks of life— metal workers, carpenters, fine artists, and fashion designers These men and women spend their time "spinning wood"—shaping pieces of madrone or big leaf maple or other hardwood into wonderful bowls, urns, bottle stoppers, and even useful utility items. You



can see evidence of that here. They employ sharp cutting tools and a machine called a lathe using technology that dates back thousands of years.

Certainly, the art is alive and well in the Pacific Northwest.

# The Possibilities!

SALAD BOWL, right? That's the first thing that comes to mind when you think of a craftsman working at a lathe — a simple, food-safe vessel. And that's where most of us start, but it doesn't take long before the myriad of possibilities becomes evident.

Add an imaginative mind to the countless variables — technology, wood species, embellishments, dyes, and finishes — and you have a wonderment of possibilities ahead of you. Lathes range in size from a sewing machine to a small farm tractor. Tools can be had that will cut, texture, chatter, core and color almost anything, and when you add the variety of wood types available (not to mention synthetic products) and inlay agents, you can understand why there are so many different types of woodturned art. Look at all the different things in this display—hollow forms, small



boxes, tall skinny finials, large flamboyant platters, seed pods, decorative wall hangings, pens, bottle stoppers — the choices are endless!

So, where do you start? What would you like to try? Something simple and functional, like a fruit bowl? Or a piece that is 'out there' and satisfies your creative

itch, like a segmented platter made from ten types of exotic woods? Are you primarily a practical personality? Or would you prefer to create something that serves no purpose other than being pretty?

We suggest you contact a local club and visit one of their meetings. Or, you can take a class, either at one of the local community colleges, a woodworkers store (some offer classes), or even a professional instructor. Those people will give you good advice, help you make the right choices, and share their passion.
